New Age Tech Meets Dead End

Students Discuss Cell Phone Ban

In January of 2006, the Department of Education made a decision to ban the possession of cell phones in all high schools across New York City. Manhattan Hunter Science is one of the many schools in NYC which currently complies with the DOE ban of cell phones. Students and teachers at MSHSHS had differing opinions about cell phones in recent interviews.

“It will make the city safer, in emergencies you’ll be able to call,” says Mary Vasquez. “Yes they can be fun, but also important for security in any situation.”

As most know, the history of the MLK campus can be known as quite infamous in the city so metal detectors for safety already ruled out bringing cellphones into the building. Though metal detectors at the entrance and exits of the building are a safety precaution, students found them more of an inconvenience, and want the option of cell phones despite arguments that they may use them to cheat.

“Even if they banned it, [students] will still cheat,” says

Gabby Cortez, Sophomore. “If kids wanted to cheat they’ll find a way.”

Paul Borisenko, Junior, thinks that cellphones are used, “More so than entertainment because they can save your life and not let parents worry.” Besides cheating purposes and distractions in rooms, most students are concerned about how a lack of communication with parents can cause as a hazard during emergencies.

“I think that when bad things happen, the parents want to be able to communicate with their kids, which can cause too many people to come to one area and slow emergency vehicles down,” says Ms. Kreisman, principal of MSHSHS. She raises the point that although students feel that cellphones can make them safer while traveling in New

York, they can pose a threat to students and even others during a time of emergency.

She sympathized with the students during an interview with a reporter at the school. She realized how important cell phones had become to high school students and how upset many students and parents “became when the policy was first implemented in high schools. But she also understood how cell phones in school could cause even more trouble with the continuing advancements in technology.

Why Vote for Females?

Teachers, Students Discuss Women in Politics

With Nancy Pelosi recently becoming the first woman speaker of the House of Representatives and rumors swirling that Hilary Clinton will be the next Democratic Nominee for President, the Manhattan Hunter Science High School community discussed their perspectives about women in power. The debate about having a women president astonishes some and motivates others. The issue divided the MSHS community.

Dissatisfaction with the current president, George Bush, causes some, such as junior Noora Hossain, to favor a female president. "She is likely to get the job done with a calmer attitude," she said. "She will represent everyone's ideas, including men and women."

According to some students interviewed, it seems that when deciding to elect a female president, more attention is given to the fact that the president is a woman rather than what the president has to say. Others say to be a good president you must be confident with a clear message and a plan to accomplish changes; it does not matter whether you are a man or a woman as long as you have these characteristics. "It all

depends on the politics and the way the leader presents themselves," said sophomore Matt Salha. But some students feel that women do not have the strength to deal with all the stress that a president has to go through. "Men and women are not meant to be equal," said Joel Jimenez, junior.

Why have women been seen so inferior to men? "Men have sustained and created a hold on power" said Spanish teacher Ms. Holmes. "If women were to compete with men, men would be in trouble. If women gained equal opportunities then there would be major competition." She said that men have been able to make women seem immature and incapable of doing the work that men can perform.

Chemistry teacher Mr. Rosser had a different idea. "Men are scared of women," he said. But Eralis Ventura disagrees with Rosser and says that the reason women do not influence government is because they are scared to speak their mind. "There are a not a lot of us [who speak our minds]." When asked who they would vote for as the first female president, people seemed to want teachers in power.

"Ms. Kreisman would be a good

Students Call New Bill 'Unjust'

Students and political activists in Manhattan reacted to a controversial bill, The Military Commissions Act, recently signed by President Bush in Washington. This bill allows Bush to take anybody who seems to be a threat to the country and jail them without an opportunity for trial and eliminate U.S. rights.

"I think it is a direct violation of our constitution," said William Ramirez a student of governmental studies at John Jay University who felt really upset that congress allowed this to happen. He also stated, "that it is a direct violation of our human rights, our right to privacy, and our rights to a fair trial." With this law some of our rights are eliminated according to Ramirez. On the other hand, Bush states that signing the bill was a privilege. *The Washington Post* quoted Bush as saying, "It is a rare occasion when a president can sign a bill he knows will save American lives." Supporters say that the bill can be a great way to make America safer from terrorists. This bill allows the government to obtain legal possession of individuals on American soil, and can also apply to American citizens.

"I believe it is definitely unconstitutional," said Krya Stoddart a coordinator of direct response in online fundraising at Amnesty International who is also against the Military Commissions Act. Now that democrats seized control of both the House of Representatives and the Senate "this law can be reversed right away"

said Stoddart. Since according to some people this new law eliminates some of our bill of rights it is causing some controversy. "It definitely violates the 6th and 8th amendments," she said.

The 6th amendment is the right to a speedy, public and fair trial and the 8th amendment is the one that disallows cruel and unusual punishment. According to Stoddart this law is a "devastating act" because it gives the president permission to torture who ever he feels is a threat to the country.

"Why would they make it legal to torture people?" asked Genesis Castillo, sophomore. Genesis believes it's "messed up" the fact that a bill like that was approved. According to Genesis the Military Commissions Act brings fear to a lot of people who know about it. "This affects me because I know Bush has the right to do that and it scares me," said Genesis Castillo who was shocked to hear about the Military Commissions Act.

"I'm against it, I don't think its right for him to control people," said Leiry Santos. Santos believes that writing about the Military Commissions Act in school newspapers will draw a lot of people's attention. "It is a good way to spread the old news that a lot of people were never aware of," said Leiry Santos.

"Having been in places where cellphones were permitted, there were always temptations there and there's always a possibly that it may go off," she said.

Ms. Riordan, history teacher, said, "Cellphones shouldn't be in schools, it can be a big distraction. Yes, you can call to jump other students, it definitely can influence gang violence." But Shaira Valoy, another sophomore at MHSHS says, "It all depends on the students, because some use it for bad purposes while others don't. one person can ruin the whole bunch."

Many district board members whose role it was to discuss issues in New York schools argued the ban. "Some believed that cell phones were needed by students and that the school shouldn't decide whether or not the cell phones should be permitted," says community board member Javier Chuck. The fact that some people who volunteered to work with the DOE actually disagreed with its policy makes this debate look much less clean cut than it may have in the very beginning. *Staff Reporter Diana Bailon contributed to this report.*

Since late October Nicaragua, a Central American Country located between Costa Rica and Honduras, has been the first Latin American country to completely outlaw abortion, which is the right to terminate pregnancy.

The law currently states that any doctor or woman caught performing or receiving an abortion will be given an eight year prison sentence. Many Nicaraguans feel that the new



abortion law, passed by President Enrique Bolanos, is unfair and a violation to women's rights. This is most likely because Bolanos recently asked the Nicaraguan legislation to increase the jail time to thirty years instead of eight. He wants harsher punishments for what many countries do not consider a crime.

This bill against abortion applies to all women including those who have been raped and those who have any risk of losing their life during childbirth.

On the flip side, however, this bill will most likely increase the production of condoms and other effective forms of birth control.

New Bond Makes the Cut

When Daniel Craig (Layer Cake) was announced as the replacement for Pierce Brosnan in the Bond franchise, there was an uproar. People complained mostly about his looks and his hair color. They were afraid the Bond they had come to know and love was being flushed down the toilet. The opening and response to Casino Royale however, quieted the protests.

Casino Royale hits the ground running and continues at a breakneck pace for almost the entire two and a half hours. There is a short romantic lull, but that is quickly interrupted by stunning gunfire and action. This gritty film goes back to the roots of James Bond and demonstrates how he became the 007 portrayed by players like Brosnan or Roger Moore.

After a black and white sequence in which Bond makes a dirty kill and a catchy opening sequence (Music by Chris Cornell), you are thrown into a blistering chase through Madagascar. Bond is running after a freelance bomb-maker named Mollaka (Sebastian Foucan). The chase spans across a construction site, the jungle, and an embassy. Foucan is stunning as the bomb-maker. At some points it seems as if he is defying gravity or simply floating in the air.

The movie is full of explosive action sequences like this one and gunplay. The plot is a bit confusing, seeing as it throws in many characters from early on in the movie. However, the majority of the movie revolves around a villain named Le Chiffre (Mads Mikkelsen) who just happens to weep blood. Le Chiffre is a mathematical genius that plays the stock market using money

gained from partnerships with freedom fighters or arms dealers. Mikkelsen delivers a chilling performance as Le Chiffre, especially during a squirm-inducing torture scene.

Using his ill-begotten money, Le Chiffre sets up a poker tournament into which Bond is entered to arrest Le Chiffre. Some may argue that the poker game slows the movie down, but the game is interrupted by short, intense bursts of action. Even if you don't enjoy a game of poker, the sequence won't be unbearable.

For the fans of the more cookie-cutter Bond movies, you need not worry. Casino Royale is full of Bond-style one liners and puns. There is a sufficient amount of sexiness injected into the movie by Daniel Craig and the obligatory Bond girls, played by Eva Green (Kingdom of Heaven) and Caterina Murino. M (played brilliantly by Judi Dench), is constantly astounded and angered by Bond's antics. The action may be a bit rougher and dirtier than the usual suave Bond film, but it is still Bondesque. The music is excellently woven into the movie and subtly incorporates elements of the original bond theme song.

The only disappointment to some Bond fans may be the ending of the movie. It is missing the usual explosion that has accompanied the ends of the recent Bond movies. The ending however, is still very clever and very Bond.

Casino Royale is rated PG-13 for scenes of violence, torture, and sexual content. It is a great movie for any action fan and a must-see for any Bond fan.
